What's Happening in Science @ Mossman SHS

As we wrap up another exciting term, it's time to look back at the amazing investigations, hands-on experiments, and curious questions that have driven our learning across all year levels in science. Here's what our young scientists have been up to.



Year 7 Physics

Students explored the mechanics behind simple machines, experimenting with how axles reduce friction and improve efficiency. Hands-on investigations showed how inclined surfaces reduce the effort needed to move objects, reinforcing fundamental concepts of force and motion.

Year 8 Earth Science

A fun and sticky introduction to the challenges of mining and resource extraction. Students learned about the environmental impact and importance

of sustainable practices. Using everyday materials, students constructed basic seismometers to better understand how scientists detect and measure earthquakes. Through model-building and shake tests, students discovered how

structural design impacts building stability during seismic events.



Year 9 Chemistry

Students investigated chemical reactions and confirmed the Law of Conservation

of Mass through carefully controlled combustion experiments. Our students showcased their understanding in a practical assessment, applying their knowledge to real-world chemical processes.



Year 10 Chemistry

Students explored how increasing the surface area of reactants speeds up chemical reactions through dynamic lab work. This unit had students experimenting with varying concentrations to understand their effect on reaction

speed—an essential concept for realworld applications like pharmaceuticals and food chemistry.



Year 11 & 12 Marine

From the field, Marine students sampled freshwater bugs / environments to study indicator species and assess ecosystem health—real science in action!

What's Happening in Year 8 @ Mossman SHS

We have finished another great term and are very pleased with how our cohort of 98 students performed with their studies this semester. I would like to share with you a brief overview of the results to celebrate the success of our students. The Reports show that 138 received an A grade and 288 received a B grade were awarded across the Core and Elective classes. When considering this as a total of all grades given, 55% of students received an A or B. With the inclusion of the C grades, we had 88% of our students achieve a passing grade in their subjects. This is a fantastic result of the dedication and hard work of our students and teachers. A very special highlight is that 100% of the students who studied Digital Technologies, Drama, Music or Visual Arts achieved an A, B or C grade.



Mrs Seidenkranz, Ms Wade and I are very pleased how our students are attending class, engaging with the classwork and achieving success in their assessments.

Next term we move onto the second half of the year and a new selection of electives. We also have a new year level activity that has been well received when I suggested to students. 














Congratulations on a Spectacular Talent Show!



eSafety parents

Your child's first smartphone - are they old enough?

Children often have access to devices, including smartphones, from a very young age. Whether it's watching their favourite program through streaming services on you phone, using educational apps or simply viewing photos with you and the family, they are engaging with devices in one form or another.

But when is my child old enough to

In 2012, the Australian Bureau of Statistics revealed children as young as five years old owned a mobile phone – two percent of children aged between five and eight years old, and 29 percent for children aged five to 14 years. This figure is likely to be higher now!

For many parents and carers, five years old would seem too young. For others, it might offer them peace of mind and security to know they can keep in touch with their child-especially in an emerge

The right age for your child will depend on their level of maturity. It's worth asking yourself the following questions before handing over a digital device.

- Does my child have a good sense of responsibility?
- Do they show a good understanding of action
- and consequences?




For younger children it's best to start with a mobile phone without internet access, and introduce a smartphone when they demonstra an appropriate level of maturity. Some younge children might argue that they are ready for a smartphone, especially if their friends already have one. But it's worth holding out until you feel confident that your child is mature enough.

My child has their first smartphone

When your child receives their first smartphone it's a great opportunity to instil safe online behaviours early on, so they can carry these skills through to their teens and beyond.

Here are some tips for getting them on board with good online habits.



Talk about expectations and the consequences for not meeting these rules. Depending on the age of your child, you might want to set up a writter signed agreement which lists the rules.

Here are some you may want to agree on:

- · No phones after a certain time (i.e. 8.00 pm) - unless in an emergency.
- Keep to daily screen time limits (i.e. 1 hour per school night).
- · Family time is a no-phone zone (i.e. dinner).

- . Do not share your passwords with others apart from pares
- Do not share your real name (or full name), age and address when posting, talking to strangers or on sites where anyone can see it.
- Be kind to people treat people on the phone as you would face-to-face
- Do not take or share photos of others (including friends) without their permission.
- . Tell a parent or another trusted adult if anything makes you feel uncomfortable, or if a stranger contacts you online.
- . Do not purchase or download an app or game without talking to a parent first—especially at these often have minimum age requirements.

Use technology tools to help set the boundaries to keep your child safe

Use parental controls to help manage your child's device and the types of content they can access. Most devices come with parental controls and offer a range of features;

- · IPhone: Go to Settings > General > Restrictions.
- · Android (Google Play): Go to Play Store phones use Google Play as the digital marketplace for purchasing apps and accessing content. Through Google Play you can restrict the content your child can download or purchase from Google Play.
- Google's Family Link is an app for parents to help manage their child's device and account and offers additional layers of protection. It enables parents to set screen time limits. review app permissions (such as their camera, location, contacts), block apps and approve downloads, block sites and filter content.
- . You can also check with your mobile service provider if they offer any parental control tools.

Activate any privacy settings and safety features available on the device, in web browsers and apps in some cases you can do this through parental controls or when installing apps on their phone. Carefully consider permissions and whether apps really need to access your child's location, contact list, messages and other features.

Help your child set up a pin or password to lock their phone. In addition to protecting their personal information, this will ensure that no one else can use their phone.

Help your child set up strong and unique passwords for their apps and websites. Even if the phone is locked, apps and websites can be accessed from other devices.

Communicate openly with your child, establish and maintain trust

Most importantly, communicate openly with Most importantly, communicate openly with your child about their phone and online use. It's not possible to supervise your child 24/7 and no technology tool is 100 percent effective in protesting them from online risks. So It's really important to establish and maintain trust.

- Talk openly and regularly with your child about their online activities. Show them that you are interested in how they connect with friends.
 who they talk with and the type of sites they visit.
- If you are using parental controls, be upfront about this and get them on board. Let them know that these can be reviewed and changed as they get older and they continue to demonstrate responsible behaviour.
- Talk about positive online behaviour and about respecting others online. Encourage your child to think carefully before they post, text or share comments or photos so they don't hurt or upset others. Remind them there is a real person at the end of the screen.
- · Encourage your child to come to you (or another trusted adult) if they are upset because of an online experience, even if they think they are

Make screen time interactive

 Practice 'interactive co-viewing' where you use the content on a screen to interact with your child and encourage them to engage with the content.

Try avoid screen time with mealtime

 Family mealtime and bottle/breastfeeding is an opportunity to build connection and interact with your child.





Choose content carefully

 Stick with platforms like ABC Kids that continue to develop age-appropriate and quality educational content.

Set boundaries early and follow them yourself

- · Boundaries help provide children with predictable routines, ensure they feel safe, and support them in growing in their independence.
- · Model healthy screen time behaviours and try to not be on your phone too much around them.





Spotlight on Country & Cutting-Edge Storytelling: Uncle Richard Burchill Takes *Julaymba* VR to ATOM QLD

Kuku Yalanji storytelling was front-and-centre at the Australian Teachers of Media (ATOM) Queensland State Conference "Framing the Future" at USQ Springfield on 30-31st May, when Eastern Kuku Yalanji Elder Uncle Richard Burchill invited delegates to step inside the Daintree via his award-winning Julaymba Virtual Reality Experience.

Working with his daughter Kirsty (production writer / producer) and VR experts Phoria (producers / directors), Uncle Richard has created an immersive experience that transformed the lecture theatre into the riparian world of <code>Julaymba</code>—a Yalanji word for the Daintree River. With Quest headset technology and intuitive hand-tracking, teachers felt the virtual camp-fire's warmth while hearing language, lore, and ecological wisdom passed down through generations. The project has already been

recognised nationally and internationally, including taking out **Best in Virtual Reality – Interactive Immersive Experience** at the 2023 Australian XR Festival, winning an **Anthem Award** in 2024, and featuring at **COP28's XR showcase** in Dubai.

Media Arts industry and educators were guided through the set-up, sharing how immersive tech can enrich classrooms, all whilst being lucky enough to have Uncle Richard share his story in-person. Mapping to Australian Curriculum cross-curricular priorities, the experience lets teachers embed authentic First Nations perspectives in Media Arts, Geography and Science lessons.
